Residency and Immigration during Pandemic
Brno, 15th April 2020





# State of Emergency

- Declared 13th March 2020 for one month initially.
- The Czech Republic applied various immigration measures in relation to the COVID-19 disease outbreak.
- It was extended to 30th April 2020 (Regulation of 6th April 2020).



## General Immigration Measures

- All consular posts (embassies) of the Czech Republic have been closed until further notice and will not be accepting any applications for visa or residency.
- All applications submitted at the Czech consular posts have been put on hold until further notice.
- It is forbidden to travel freely from/to the Czech Republic (see below).
- Immigration Authority (MoI) limited its activities.



### I am **EU** citizen

#### YOU ARE IN THE CZECH REPUBLIC

(without temporary/permanent residency)

- You can stay or work in CZ.
- You can arrange Certificate of Temporary Residency via postal mail (recommended).

#### Travel?

- You cannot travel abroad freely.
- You can travel home based on a note issued by my Embassy in Prague. I cannot come back.



### I am **EU** citizen

#### YOU ARE IN THE CZECH REPUBLIC

(with temporary/permanent residency)

You can stay or work in CZ.

#### Travel?

- You can travel abroad due to work or family reasons and come back (but mandatory quarantine for 14 days after returning back to CZ).
- You can travel abroad in extraordinary cases (funeral, airport pick-up, doctor visit, court hearing, etc.) for period less than 24 hours (quarantine is not required).
- Purpose of trip must be proven!
- Return to the Czech Republic must be announced to Czech Embassy in advance!
- It is forbidden to travel for tourism.



## I am **non-EU** citizen

#### YOU ARE IN THE CZECH REPUBLIC

(without valid permit of stay)

...your visa expires, you have Schengen visa or you are staying based on non-visa regime

- If you were in CZ legally as of 12<sup>th</sup> March 2020, you are allowed to stay legally during the state of emergency and for period of 60 days after termination of the emergency state, no need for visa nor permit.
- You cannot apply for a visa in the Czech Republic.

#### Travel?

You cannot travel abroad freely but you can travel home based on a note issued by your Embassy in Prague. I cannot come back.



# I am **non-EU** citizen

#### YOU ARE IN THE CZECH REPUBLIC

(with valid permit/visa over 90 days)

- There are the same rules related to travelling from/to the Czech Republic as for Czech and EU citizens with residency (see above slide 5).
- You have to follow my IMMI obligations (notification of changes, extending permits etc).
- It is possible to file all notifications and applications via registered postal mail to respective MoI. Do not wait till the end of state of emergency! -- double-check that you mentioned correct corresponding address and there is name on your mailbox.
- If a personal attendance is required, MoI will invite you to Immigration Authority once it is possible.

#### Travel?

Return to the Czechs Republic must be announced to Czech Embassy in advance!



### I am EU or non-EU citizen

#### YOU ARE NOT IN THE CZECH REPUBLIC

- You cannot travel to the Czech Republic without valid permit (Certificate of Temporary Residency, Permanent Residency, Employee Card, Blue Card, Long-term visa for students/dependents etc).
- You cannot enter based on an entry visa (D/VR visa).
- You cannot enter based on so called bridging visa.



# Contact Mol (Ministry of Interior)

- All former appointments were cancelled, you have to arrange a new appointment.
- You cannot visit Immigration Authority without an appointment.
- You can arrange an appointment for the following tasks only:
  - Registration upon arrival including collection of biometric data,
  - Issuance of biometric residence cards
  - Issuance of the bridging visa for leaving the Czech Republic (no return!).
